The purpose of this book is to advance responsible rehabilitation of the speculative philosophy of history. It challenges the idea popularized by thinkers such as and Claude Lévi-Strauss and Jean-François Lyotard that historical meta-mythology and meta-narrative are philosophically obsolete. As long as humanity, viewed anthropologically, lives by over-arching narrative, the quest for a version that survives rational criticism remains vital. Here human rights serve as the key to unlock such a version. Despite the fact that the Hegelian philosophy of history has often been derided, something very similar currently functions as the official ideology of the world community: the idea of history as the story of freedom. This book does not retell the world-historical story of freedom. Its conclusion is that a forward retelling of the story of freedom as the story of human rights can be justified by dewesternizing the story. Francis Fukuyama's controversial 1992 book *The End of History and the Last Man* demonstrates an important aspect of creative thinking: the ability to generate hypotheses and create novel explanations for evidence. In the case of Fukuyama's work, the central hypothesis and explanation he put forward were not, in fact, new, but they were novel in the academic and historical context of the time. Fukuyama's central argument was that the end of the Cold War was a symptom of, and a vital waypoint in, a teleological progression of history. Interpreting history as "teleological" is to say that it is headed towards a final state, or end point: a state in which matters will reach an equilibrium in which things are as good as they can get. For Fukuyama, this would mean the end of "mankind's ideological evolution and the universalization of Western liberal democracy as the final form of human government". This grand theory, which sought to explain the end of the Cold War through a single overarching hypothesis, made the novel step of resurrecting the German philosopher G.W.F. Hegel's theory of history – which had long been ignored by practical historians and political philosophers – and applying it to current events.

This work offers a sweeping re-assessment of the Jiankang Empire (3rd-6th centuries CE), known as the Chinese "Southern Dynasties." It shows how, although one of the medieval world's largest empires, Jiankang has been rendered politically invisible by the standard narrative of Chinese nationalist history, and proposes a new framework and terminology for writing about medieval East Asia. The book pays particular attention to the problem of ethnic identification, rejecting the idea of "ethnic Chinese," and delineating several other, more useful ethnographic categories using case studies in agriculture/foodways and vernacular languages. The most important, the Wuren of the lower Yangtze region, were believed to be inherently different from the peoples of the Central Plains, and the rest of the book adds

the extent of their ethnogenesis in the medieval era. It assesses the political culture of the Jiankang Empire, emphasizing military strategy, institutional cultures, and political economy, showing how it differed from Central Plains-based empires while having significant similarities to Southeast Asian regimes. It then explores how the Jiankang monarchs deployed three distinct repertoires of political legitimation (vernacular, Sinitic universalist, and Buddhist), arguing that the Sinitic repertoire was largely eclipsed in the sixth century, rendering the regime yet more similar to neighboring South Seas states. The conclusion points out how the research re-orientates our understanding of acculturation and ethnic identity in medieval East Asia, generates new insights into the Tang-Song transition period, and offers new avenues of comparison with Southeast Asian and medieval European history.

This two-part commentary argues that Chronicles, placed as it is among the 'historical books' in the traditional Old Testament of the Christian church, is much misunderstood. As subsequent history only too clearly shows, however, the Chronicler argues (Volume 2), that Israel itself, through unfaithfulness to Torah, has forfeited its right to possession of its land and is cast adrift among these same nations of the world. But the Chronicler's message is one of hope. By a radical transformation of the chronology of Israel's past into theological terms, the generation whom the Chronicler addresses becomes the fiftieth since Adam. It is the generation to whom the jubilee of return to the land through a perfectly enabled obedience to Torah, and thus the restoration of the primal ideal of the human race, is announced.

International Organizations play a pivotal role on the modern global stage and have done, this book argues, since the beginning of the 20th century. This volume offers the first historical exploration into the formative years of international public administrations, covering the League of Nations and the emergence of the second generation that still shape international politics today such as the UN and the OECD. Centring on Europe, where the multilateralization of international relations played out more intensely in the mid-20th century, and other parts of the world, it demonstrates a broad range of historiographical and methodological approaches to institutions in world history. The book argues that after several 'turns' (cultural, linguistic, material, transnational), international history is now better able to restate its core questions of policy and power with a view to their institutional dimensions. Making use of new approaches in international history, it develops an understanding of the specific powers and roles of IO-administrations by delving into their institutional make-up. This academic work, inheriting and developing the basic principles of Marxism, analyzes the world's historical structure by using dialectics and forecasts the direction of the socialist movement and the ways to realize communism. It not only makes up for a missing dynamic part of Marxist theory but also points out a logical path for the development of human society. Furthermore, it provides a theoretical basis and practice of China's "the Belt and Road Initiative" from various aspects and provides the theoretical basis and rationale for the Chinese community with a shared future for mankind. The theory about the contradictory movement between productive forces and production relations is the crucial part of Marxism and used to guide socialist revolution and construction as well as analyze world history. Nevertheless, the writers failed to unveil their relations due to the historical limitations of materialist dialectics and lack of horizontal perspective on the development of nature and human society. As a result, either productive forces or production relations are regarded as the driving factor in Marxist theory and practice, and the argument remains. This book, based on a large number of empirical analyses, solves the fundamental problem of historical materialism from the perspective of geographical competition. This book holds that after the formation of agriculture in the Neolithic Age, species competition was replaced by land-based geographic competition, which has become the driving force for the development of human society. It not only brought about private ownership and social organizations such as clans, tribes, nationalities, classes, countries and regions, but also made the "two poles" of the East and the West compete in various forms, develop productive forces and shape world history after the formation of the Inner Asian nomads. This book divides the "bipolar" competitions between the East and the West after 500 B.C. into three stages. The beginning of the first stage was feudal China as the power core, ending with the rise of capitalist United Kingdom, which was the power core of the second stage, with the acquisition of "land taxes" as its driving force, four relatively independent political-economic entities were formed to the West with decreasing civilization degree: ancient China, Inner Asia, Islam and Europe (referred to as Zone 4, Zone 3, Zone 2, and Zone 1 respectively in this book). The second stage, with the capitalist UK as the power core, ended with the development of socialism.

the core of power at the third stage. The driving force at this stage was the attainment of "raw material market." Based on a bipolar world pattern, two relatively independent political-economic entities, the capitalist system and the socialist system, have emerged from the West to the East. This stage was divided into three phases of economic colonization, focusing on the realms of public monopoly and competition. This book uses a large amount of historical data to analyze the specific levels of the two stages. In fact, the factual data support is not sufficient sometimes and some conclusions are open to discussion, the theoretical system is complex, and the macro events and the overall framework is convincing. By analyzing the first and second stages, this book makes a theoretical prediction about the phases and outcomes of the third stage. This book holds that the third stage began with the development of socialist China and the realization of world communism and the extinction of geo-competitive relations. The driving force of this stage is the acquisition of "property rights cooperation." Based on the second-stage bipolar world pattern, it will undergo three phases of state-owned enterprise cooperation in the realm of competition, natural monopoly and public goods. The world, from east to west, will form an entity with a significant difference.
